## EQUIPMENT

#### **Equipment Specifics**

Laptop Computer	<ul> <li>Get a light computer. You may have to take it everywhere with you, both because you need to work on it, and because it is safer with you.</li> <li>Things to keep in mind when selecting a computer: <ul> <li>(1) how much memory does it have?</li> <li>(2) can you burn CDs/DVDs (for backup)?</li> <li>(3) will it be compatible with the software you are planning to use?</li> <li>(4) will your funding agency pay for it? Things to keep in mind: <ul> <li>(1) how much memory does it have?</li> <li>(2) how long can it run on its battery at the setting you need?</li> <li>(3) what kinds of batteries does it take? Can you get them in the field, or can you bring rechargeable ones?</li> <li>(4) how do you connect it to your computer?</li> <li>(5) will you be recording at night?</li> <li>(6) are you satisfied with the quality of the audio? Voice Recorder	<ul> <li>You may want to get one that records at 44 KHz. You may want to consider a mini disk recorder.<sup>1</sup></li> <li>Things to keep in mind: <ul> <li>(1) how much memory does it have?</li> <li>(2) how long can it run on its battery at the setting you need?</li> <li>(3) what kinds of batteries does it take? Microphones	<ul> <li>Things to keep in mind: <ol> <li>your sound will only be as good as your microphone</li> <li>do you need different types of microphones for different types of data collection, e.g. headmounted, clip-on, etc.?</li> <li>does your microphone need batteries? If you can plug it in to an electronic outlet, do you have the cable you need?</li> <li>does it need to be grounded?</li> <li>are the plugs of your microphones the same ones your recorder takes?<sup>5</sup></li> <li>you may be able to plug your microphone into your recorder, but that does not mean that the sound quality you get is acceptable. Check this before going into the field.</li> </ol> </li> </ul>		patteries pables
Surge Protector	You may need this to protect your equipment if the area you are going to has frequent power surges.	<b>A</b>	
Printer <sup>3</sup>	Heavy and may take up a lot of space, but can be extremely useful. You can make printouts for informants or yourself to check. Also, you can leave copies at the field site.	> c	connecting cable cartridges paper
Solar Panel <sup>1</sup>	<ul> <li>Is there a reliable energy source where you are going?</li> <li>Will you have regular access to it? If not, you may consider a solar panel.</li> <li>Things to keep in mind: <ul> <li>(1) weight. Will you have to carry it everywhere?</li> <li>(2) Voltage and Amperage: is it sufficient for everything you need to charge, especially your computer?</li> <li>(3) can the solar panel be connected to everything you need to charge?</li> <li>(4) how sturdy is it? Do you expect that it will get kicked around a lot?</li> </ul> </li> </ul>	Y s e	battery to store 'extra energy'. You may also need this if the solar panel does not output enough amperage connecting cables
Thumbdrive <sup>6</sup>	This is great for backup and easy to carry.	4

# **General Equipment Notes**

Summary of things to check for all your equipment.

Item	Comments	
Weight	How much does the item weigh, including all extras (cables, storage media, battery or batteries, protective cases, etc.)?	
Storage Media	<ul> <li>Do you have the proper storage media for your equipment (memory card, memory stick, etc.)?</li> <li>How much data fits on the storage medium? Do you need to get one with more space? Do you need more than one?</li> <li>Do you want to be able to plug the storage medium directly into your computer, or is it OK if you have to connect the equipment to the computer?</li> <li>Can you get storage media locally?</li> </ul>	
Connectivity	<ul> <li>Can all your equipment be connected with any other equipment as planned?</li> <li>Do you have the proper cables?</li> <li>Does your equipment have the proper ports? Maybe you need an adapter of some sort?</li> <li>Depending on which method of transfer you use, how lossy is the transfer? How fast is the transfer?</li> </ul>	
Battery Endurance / Power	<ul> <li>How long can your equipment run on a normal setting / high setting without changing the battery? (This may depend on the temperature.) Can you get a battery with more endurance?</li> <li>Does the equipment have to be plugged in to perform certain functions?</li> <li>Do you have the proper plugs for the electric outlets? Do you have an adapter?</li> <li>Do you need rechargeable batteries (e.g. for a digital still camera)? Can your battery recharger be connected to your adapter?</li> <li>Take two sets of rechargeable batteries for everything.<sup>8</sup></li> <li>Can you get batteries locally?</li> <li>For the converter/adapter, make sure that: <ul> <li>all your equipment that needs to be plugged in can be connected to your converter/adapter<sup>1</sup></li> <li>your adapter has plugs for any outlet you might encounter (some countries have more than one type of outlet)</li> </ul> </li> </ul>	
Climate / Environment	<ul> <li>If you are going to a place with an extreme climate, you may want to check the following: <ul> <li>can you equipment be exposed to extreme (low and high) temperatures?</li> <li>what about extreme fluctuations in temperature?</li> <li>do you have any way to protect your equipment from extreme temperatures (e.g. keeping all batteries in inside pockets close to your body)</li> <li>what about extreme humidity or dryness/static?</li> </ul> </li> <li>how much being kicked around can your equipment put up with?</li> <li>do you have a way to protect your equipment from dust/sand?</li> </ul>

Tickets to your destination	<ul> <li>Things to keep in mind: <ul> <li>(1) what will be the price of the tickets at the time of year you are planning to travel?</li> <li>(2) can you get directly where you need to go, or will you need to buy additional tickets once you get into the country?</li> <li>(3) will you be able to get there by plane, or will you need to take other types of transportation? Train, car, boat, horse, camel,</li> <li>(4) long trips: if you are staying over 8 months, a return ticket may not be available and there may be a surcharge for an open return ticket.<sup>5</sup></li> <li>(5) In some cases a return ticket may be required for the visa.<sup>7</sup></li> </ul> </li> </ul>	
Daily Transportation	How will you get around once you get to your destination?	
Insurance	<ul> <li>Things to keep in mind: <ul> <li>(1) does your insurance cover you while you travel?</li> <li>(2) is medical evacuation covered? Up to what amount?</li> <li>(3) is your equipment and other luggage insured?</li> <li>(4) keep a number of copies of your insurance information (contact number, insurances, etc.) with you<sup>2</sup></li> </ul> </li> </ul>

Medical Bracelet <sup>2</sup>	If you have any medical allergies, wear a medical bracelet or dog tag. Things to keep in mind: (1) can you get it translated into the local language?	>

Inoculations	Check with your doctor what you will need in the region you are going to. Make sure that inoculations you got in the past are up do date. You may want to start this at least 6 months before you leave, since some inoculations cannot be taken together at the same time, and for some inoculations you may need a series of shots.	<b>&gt;</b>
Things to do <sup>1</sup>	You may not be able to work all the time. Take something to do during the time you can't work: knitting, fishing kit, books, music. You may not be able to get it locally.

CDs/DVDs	<ul><li>Things to keep in mind:</li><li>(1) can you get them where you are going?</li><li>(2) do you want cases (weigh more, but may provide more protection)</li></ul>	> cases
Flashlight <sup>1</sup>	<ul> <li>To read in bed at night and go to the bathroom, etc.</li> <li>Things to keep in mind: <ul> <li>(1) head-mounted it very convenient (but in any case try to get something that will leave your hands free)</li> <li>(2) power: batteries, or powered by movement</li> </ul> </li> </ul>	batteries?
Desiccation bags <sup>1</sup>	To dry out you electronic equipment. Especially if you are going to a humid place, e.g. rain forest.

Rent	Where are you going to live? Find out how much you can be expected to pay per day/month.	
Food	Again, check with a person who knows the area.

Luggage	What kind of luggage will you take? It will probably depend on how 'portable' you need to be. Consider backpacks, duffel bags, suitcases (?).Things to keep in mind: (1) water proofing (2) discouraging tampering/theft	
Money	<ul> <li>Give some thought to how you are going to carry/get money.</li> <li>Things to keep in mind: <ol> <li>can you convert travelers checks where you are going?<sup>4</sup></li> <li>which currency/currencies will be the most convenient? US\$? Euro? Something else?</li> <li>you may not be able to use you credit/debit/bank card where you are going. There may be no ATMS, they may not accept your card, or the fee may be prohibitive. Check before you go.</li> <li>is there any way you can open a bank account locally? Can you transfer/wire money from your home account to your 'abroad account'? How much will your bank charge?</li> <li>you may want to invest in a money belt</li> </ol> </li> </ul>	
Mailing / Internet Access	<ul> <li>How are you planning to do back-ups? Will you be able to mail back hard copies? Are you going to email backups?</li> <li>Things to keep in mind: <ul> <li>(1) how fast is the internet connection where you are going? Will you be able to email large attachments?</li> <li>(2) how much does it cost to use the internet connection?</li> <li>(3) how much will it cost you to mail out regular back-ups by snail mail?</li> </ul> </li> </ul>	
Incidentals	<ul> <li>I have found the following items useful:</li> <li>duct tape</li> <li>twine/string</li> <li>sewing kit (thread, sewing needles, small scissors, piece of fabric for patches)</li> <li>scotch tape</li> <li>re-sealable plastic bags in various sizes</li> <li>little plastic bottles with screw-on lid (for shampoo, soap, disinfectant, etc.)</li> </ul>

Gifts	<ul> <li>What is an appropriate gift will depend on a number of different factors. Here are some suggestions:</li> <li>fabric<sup>1</sup></li> <li>clothes<sup>1</sup></li> <li>food<sup>1</sup></li> <li>flashlights<sup>1</sup></li> <li>toys for children<sup>1</sup></li> <li>hair ornaments<sup>1</sup></li> <li>pictures (of the area/people)<sup>1</sup></li> <li>small keepsakes from your home country/town</li> </ul>

Passport	➢ In most cases, you will need a passport that is valid for at least another year.
Visa	<ul> <li>Where do you apply for your visa?</li> <li>Do you need to apply in person, or can your travel agency take care of it?</li> <li>How much will it cost?</li> <li>How long will it take?</li> <li>What kind of visa do you need (student, tourist, professional; 1 month, 3 months, 1 year; single entry or multiple entry)?</li> <li>Can you renew/extend your visa locally? How much will it cost and how long does it take?</li> <li>Which forms do you need to fill out? Where can you get them?</li> <li>Do you need specially formatted pictures (size, angle, background color, etc.)?</li> </ul>
Letters / Proofs	<ul> <li>You may need the following for your grant application and/or your visa application, or to work efficiently in the field:</li> <li>&gt; letter of introduction</li> <li>&gt; letter of recommendation</li> <li>&gt; proof of employment</li> <li>&gt; proof of enrollment (school/university)</li> </ul>
All papers	<ul> <li>leave copies of everything with a person you trust at home</li> <li>take one set of copies with you</li> </ul>
